Comments from the President

Dear Friends:

We get lots and lots of letters in our business office. Most of the time, they accompany maintenance payments. Lately, however the letters are responses to the maintenance increase request. I sometimes have to chuckle, sitting in the president's chair, and wondering how on earth to please everyone.

Well, let's forget about that impossible task! Some letters tell us to hold the line on our spending. (Heaven knows, we accomplished that last year, we scrimped, saved, pinched the penny and, thank goodness, remained solvent for another year. We had no spare pennies to spend foolishly. Our staff should be congratulated on holding the line. Some tell us we should be spending money to improve the golf course. Then, we get those that tell us not to put a dime into the course, let it support itself. One asked why we aren't maintaining (mowing) all the lots? (Over 8,000 lots. I wonder what that would cost us?) Quite a few tell us to improve our roads. Yes, we would like to and we do as much as our budget allows maintaining the crumbling infrastructure. Still others tell us to give the roads to the county and let them overhaul our roads. Many tell us that only homeowners should be paying maintenance. Pick your topic and we have it in a note or letter.

So, what to do with so many conflicting

suggestions? We do what we have to do. We do the appropriate things considering the entire development and with a heavy sense of responsibility to everyone. With such limited funds with which to work, we hardly have many options. Last year was very difficult. This year will be worse. And, revenues will decrease again in 2011 due to lower assessed valuations in a still declining real estate market.

At times, while working on the maintenance increase, I have been reminded of Don Quixote and the 'Impossible Dream'. But, we are now getting closer and my hopes are remaining optimistic. We still need 1200+ more votes and we continue to work on this project. I would like to see this mission accomplished before the end of my tenure as president. If I can't, it will be a terrible disappointment to me but I know those remaining on the board will continue to work hard at it. This is the right thing to do, it is what our Covenants call for, it is what the Courts said we should do and it will be the fix we need.

In the meantime, to help us keep the faith, some of the cards and letters are in a very positive vein. They tell us we are doing a good job, they support us and they thank us. Frequently, these letters include a donation which would be the equivalent of the increase requested. To all of you, thank you for your interest in your community.

Parkways

The last of the pot holes were filled in January. An agriculture style gate was placed at the north end of Orange Avenue because people in motor vehicles were hunting. The hunters were also tripping the doors on the pig traps, all of them. We then had no line of defense to stop the pigs from Sumica from roaming in ILE.

Culverts were replaced on two streets. One on a paved road, one on a grass street. The culverts were in the early stage of collapsing thus avoiding any major collapse.

Road millings were used to repair several intersection damaged by trash trucks.

The spider mower cleared the ditch on State Road 60 and the headwalls for the culverts on all streets in the subdivision. We are still cleaning the fire breaks of growth that we could not take care of during normal mowing season.

Man-made trails leading into our subdivision along County Road 630 were blocked off by parkways.

Several dump sites were cleaned up, also old galvanized culverts that collapsed and were left throughout the subdivision, many from decades ago, are being carted away. It will take some time but they will finally all be gone. A load of firewood was picked up and carted away from a camp fire site in the middle of a paved road in the Woodlands.

A clean up of the 40 acre plat with the tree farm is complete. The palm trees were also pruned

and the palm fronds carted away.
